

Lucy Raven: Pressure & Release New Art21 Film to Premiere Online on September 17, 2025

Lucy Raven uses film, photography, and installation to examine the build-up and collapse of infrastructures and images.

New York, New York—September 10, 2025—Art21 today announced the release of *Lucy Raven: Pressure & Release*, a new documentary film that captures the artist as she travels to Oregon and California documenting the removal of one of four dams on the Klamath River for *Murderers Bar* (2025), the final film in Raven's *The Drumfire* (2020-2025) series. From a cement plant in Idaho to an explosives testing ground in New Mexico to a dam removal in California, *The Drumfire* critically reflects on the ideologies and industries that transform and deform the American West.

Directed by Ian Forster, the film premieres online **Wednesday, September 17** at **12 pm ET** on <u>Art21.org</u> and <u>YouTube</u>.

As the leading independent producer documenting the art of our time, Art21 was established with a mission to expand access to artists and their ideas, meet audiences where they are, and explore the salient connections between artists and their communities. To date, Art21 has created 80+ hours of films documenting over 300 artists across six continents.

Murderers Bar documents the largest dam removal in the history of the United States, the result of decades of effort by the Yurok Tribe, Karuk Tribe, Hoopa Valley Tribe, Klamath Tribes, Modoc Nation, and Shasta Indian Nation. Using helicopters, drones, underwater cameras, and animated sequences, Raven visualizes how the build-up and release of pressure transform both land and life.

"It wasn't just dirt that was released," says Raven. "It was actually a hundred years of this industrial exploitation of that region."

"One of the most exciting aspects of working on this film was being out in the field with Lucy along the Klamath River, and witnessing how thoughtfully she approached filming in the region," says **lan Forster**, director and Art21 senior producer. "The story of the dam being removed was decades in the making, and led by activism from local tribes whose lives are intertwined with the river and its ecology. Lucy spent years building the relationships that allowed her to film the actual release moment, while being careful not to speak on behalf of their efforts, but rather from her position as an artist, a visitor, and a guest."
